Introduction

Orange County Drug Free Community (Dr. Thomas Hall)

 Dr. Thomas Hall: In addition to committee reports, four presentations, two updates from Opioid Settlements funds, and two groups will present proposals for consideration for funding

Florida Department of Health in OC (Ronique Bain, MPH)

- In the first quarter, the number of Fentanyl and Opioid urgent care visits increased.
- All drug urgent care visits decreased.
- Males were predominantly the ones getting care.
- Summary of Orange County Facilities with ED/ Urgent Care Visits
 - Orlando Regional Medical Center-49
 - Advent Health East Orlando-44
 - Advent Health Orlando-27
 - o Orlando Health Central-24
 - o Dr. P. Philips Hospital-23
- About 79.6% of visitors are Orange County residents.

Subcommittee Updates— Law Enforcement

Central Florida HIDTA (Paul E. Maxwell, Jr. DIO)

- Fentanyl/Heroin remains the top drug threat in central Florida:
 - Due to the highest percentage of non-fatal and fatal overdose deaths
 - In the 2nd Quarter of 2025, the CFHIDTA initiatives seized 20.5 kilograms of fentanyl, 130,395 fentanyl pills, and approximately 17 grams of Heroin
 - o Both are down from Q1 of 2024
 - heroin seizures have increased in the western regions of the United States
 - Crystal Methamphetamine/ Ice ranked second-highest threat in Central Florida:
 - Testing revealed a purity of 95-98 percent
 - In the 2nd Quarter of 2025, the CFHIDTA initiatives seized approximately 18.3 kilograms of methamphetamine
 - In the 1st Quarter of 2025, the CFHIDTA initiatives seized about 130 kilograms of methamphetamine
 - Cocaine ranked the third-highest threat in Central Florida:
 - Mainly supplied by Colombian TCOs via the Caribbean Corridor and smuggled to Puerto Rican and Dominican drug Trafficking organizations
 - In the 2nd Quarter of 2025, the CFHIDTA initiatives seized approximately 157 kilograms of Cocaine
 - In the 1st Quarter of 2025, the CFHIDTA initiatives seized approximately 160 kilograms of Cocaine
 - Current FDLE laboratory analyst has detected BTMPS in numerous drug seizures, almost always combined with fentanyl

Orange County Sheriff's Office (Lieutenant Shane DeJarnett)

- Transitioned to a new reporting system to populate numbers better
- Overdose trends in Florida are like those around the country
- Local drug seizures in the past quarter:
 - o 22 Kilograms of Cocaine
 - o Promethazine, MDMA, Fentanyl Pills, and Cocaine
 - o Cases concluded with over 170 lbs. of Cocaine seized
 - o Recent Seizures (dog) 1st 24 lbs. methamphetamine 2nd time Kilo of Cocaine
 - Criminal drug networks are increasingly producing fake press pills that are Naloxoneresistant

Orlando Police Department (Sergeant, Kevin López)

- Events in 2nd quarter 2025
 - Donate Easter Baskets to Project Noelle for children whose parents died of an overdose
- DEA Pill Take Back Event
 - Several cities in Orange County hosted drug takeback sites
 - Over 100 pounds of pills were collected
- Case Update: Indictment
 - On May 8, 2025, OIU and the SAO presented the overdose death case to a Grand Jury. Hector Luis Lefebre was officially indicted for: Death caused by the unlawful Distribution of fentanyl
- Statistical Comparison 2024 VS 2025
 - Overdose Deaths Q2 2024: 10 | Q2 2025: 13
 - o Naloxone Deployments Q2 of 2024: 33 | Q2 2025: 26
- Year-To-Date Comparison
 - 2024 vs 2025 Fatal Overdoses 21% as of 7/16/2025

Education & Prevention & Treatment

Orlando Health (Jaime Bridges, LCSW)

- Opioid Navigators interventions:
 - Expand the MAT bridge program through designating an LCSW or LMHC "Opioid Champion" within the care management team at all Orlando Health Campuses to
 - 292 Narcan kits were given to patients admitted to the ED or inpatient hospital services
 - 254 patients provided short-term MAT scripts to bridge the patient to outside treatment
 - o Provided Education to 54 providers at ORMC

 To date, 405 patients have been discharged with short-term buprenorphine scripts to bridge patients to outside treatment

AdventHealth (Michelle Dodson, LCSW)

- Expanding Navigator staff to help with intensive case management.
- Referring patients to various levels of care
 - 162 referred to Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT)
 - 128 referred to outpatient
- Discharged Medications for MAT
 - o 109 boxes of Narcan distributed
 - o 68 patients discharged on Buprenorphine medication
- Consults for Chemical Dependency vs Addiction Medicine
 - 1,537 consults to chemical dependency and 638 consults to addiction medicine

Opioid Settlements Funds Activities

Orange County Health Services - Marketing (Zach Downes & Kariely Negron)

- Takeaways from the 2025 National Conference on Health Communication, Marketing, and Media (NCHCMM)
 - Acceptability & influence of health communications campaigns, shaping public perception & how they view health issues, youth substance use prevention & the relationship to mental health, nicotine & today's youth
 - Empowering parents & educators to prevent use
- Current Health Marketing Efforts
 - The Stop Overdose Campaign, however, is designed to target ages 18-34 with digital ads/social media, radio streaming, billboards, Lynx transit (buses & shelters), gas stations & local bars, and community events.
- New: Youth-Specific Efforts
 - CDC Free Mind Campaign & Vaping Education targeting among youth ages 12-17 (teens)
 - Connect young people with substance use, mental health, and drug overdose
 - Educate youth to initiate conversations with their parents, caregivers, and educators about mental health challenges.
- Planned Implementation Approach
 - Engaging the community through multiple media platforms & trusted voices (targeting both youth & parents/caregivers): PSA's, Fact Sheets & other materials, resource & conversation guides, community partnerships.

• STEPS (Cheryl Bello)

- Women's Residential 100% Occupancy
 - Funding has enabled them to enhance existing programs to meet the community's needs
 - o Since May 2024, 33 unduplicated women with children have been served
 - o Also, ensuring better physical health and coordinating medical care onsite
 - 100% Child Welfare Reunifications
 - No re-admissions within one year
- Pregnant Post-Partum Women
- Parenting, anger management, trauma, domestic violence, nutrition, self-help coping skills
- Reducing immense costs to multiple publicly funded systems
 - \$1,250,00 Neonatal care (5 drug-free babies)
 - o \$1,036,000 Jail nights (20 x women diverted from 365-day
 - \$120.00 Foster Care (18 children)
- Better Access to Treatment: Return on Investment Savings
 - \$91,638 27 Non-Emergency ER Admissions \$3,394 (average cost reported by MIRA)
 - \$184,500 9 Overdose ICU admissions (\$20,500 ICU cost reported by HFMA)
 - \$750,00 Healthy newborns (\$250,000 NICU stay)
 - \$473,040 9 x One year jail sentences (\$144 per day cost)
 - \$69,120 x 15 VOP (30-day average jail nights)
 - \$14,000 x 14 Baker Act (\$900 based on a 30-day stay reported by legal clarity)
 - \$13,728 x 32 Non-violent Crimes (\$429 cost to respond only to a non-violent crime reported by RAND)

Youth Families and Communities United (Sharon Warner)

- Focus on Prevention; School-Based Education, Family Centered interventions,
 Community-Based Programs, Community Outreach/Engagement
 - Multiple weekly morning resiliency-based parent programs at OCPS that engage parents
 - Multiple weekly evening resiliency-based family programs at OCPS that engage youth and parents in activities together
- CORE Mission and Achievements

 Youth come back and give back
 - Staff and volunteers serve as mentors to parents and students

Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Florida (Jamie Merrill)

- Opioid Prevention Programming
- Supporting more than 13,000 Youth across five counties
 - 99% of teens abstain from smoking,
 - o 98% abstain from using marijuana

- o 97% abstain from alcohol.
- o 97% promoted to next grade level
- o 95% Club members feel a strong connection with a trusted adult
- o 93% of members feel physically safe at the club
